An emotional support animal may not accompany an individual into places where animals, other than service animals, are prohibited, but must be considered for access to university housing facilities. An emotional support animal must be caged, crated, or otherwise confined when the handler is not present. The animal must be under the control of the handler at all times when the handler is present.

\*If you have questions regarding ADA regulations concerning service animals other than dogs, please contact the Disability Resource Center.

### Documentation guidelines

Any student who wishes to bring an emotional support animal to Montclair State University must register with the Disability Resource Center, Cole Hall 331 (Phone - 973-655-5431) . Documentation that the individual is a person with a disability, and that the presence of the animal is a reasonable and appropriate accommodation must be provided from an appropriate medical clinician on the appropriate form. No inquiries can or will be made regarding the training or certification of the animal in compliance with federal law. Students who are requesting service animals must indicate what specific service or task the animal is trained to perform. No further documentation is required. Those requesting Emotional support animals must have the appropriate form completed by a mental health professional.

### **Responsibility of Persons with Service or Emotional Support Animals**

**Care and Supervision:** Care and supervision of the animal are the responsibility of the individual who benefits from the animal's use. The handler must commit to providing proper care of the animal, which includes, feeding, fresh water, exercise and rest. The handler is required to maintain control of the animal at all times. The animal must be on a leash, harness, or other tether when in public places, unless doing so would inhibit the animal's ability to be of service. The handler is also responsible for maintaining a clean living environment for the animal, ensuring the cleanup of the animal's waste and, when appropriate, must toilet the animal in areas designed by the University consistent with the reasonable capacity of the owner. Owners of service and emotional/support animals are responsible for their care in the residence halls at all times. If at any point, the owner cannot care for the animal, as in the case of illness or hospitalization, an emergency contact must be on file with the Disability Resource Center and Residential Education and Services, so the animal can be released to the care of the designated party.

**Health and Vaccination:** In accordance with local ordinances and regulations, the animal must be immunized against diseases common to that type of animal. For example, dogs must have current vaccination against rabies and distemper. Cats must have the normal shots required for licensure. Animals, other than cats and dogs, living  
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in University housing must have an annual clean bill of health from a licensed veterinarian. Documentation can be a vaccination certificate for the animal and/or a veterinarian's statement regarding the animal's health.
